FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHERE WILL THE CLASSES BE HELD & WHAT ABOUT PARKING?

The majority of the classes are located at the OSU Foundation building on the corner of 35th and Western. There is free and ample parking there. Some classes are held at other locations. Class descriptions in the course information section indicate which classes will be held elsewhere.

For classes held on the OSU Campus, there are three options:

- 1) Use the free parking lot on the south side of Reser Stadium and catch the on-campus shuttle or walk to the class location.
- 2) Park at the Foundation building, car-pooling to an on-campus parking lot where you can use the **Temporary Parking Permit** which ALL will provide. Car pools leave the parking lot 20 minutes before class. (Sign up using the Registration Form and include a D beside the box if you are willing to be a driver.) We plan for three people per car when ordering Temporary Parking Permits.
- 3) Pick up your own Temporary Parking Permit at the Visitor Kiosk on Jefferson, west of 11th Street.

HOW DO I JOIN?

Membership in ALL is \$100 per year. New members can attend as few or as many classes for a full year beginning the quarter in which they join. (Additional fees are charged for a few classes to cover books, travel, class materials, etc.). Use the included registration form to indicate your selections so instructors can plan for handouts. Some class sizes are limited.

Suggested registration deadline for Fall term is September 1st. Registrations will be accepted after that date, but limited sized classes fill quickly. Join today!

1. Issues and Ideas

Tuesday, September 16, 1:30–3:30 PM: The Future of Pacific Northwest Salmon: Anatomy of a Crisis

Pacific Northwest salmon continue to decline in spite of our commitment to their recovery. Robert T. Lackey, Special Assistant for Salmon Research, EPA Research Laboratory, examines, "How can it be that protecting and restoring wild salmon can be universally supported by the public, yet the prognosis for their future is so bleak?"

Tuesday, September 23, 1:30–3:30 PM: Decoding the Puzzle Palace, or...What Do They Put in That Coffee in the Capital Basement?

Bill Lunch, Professor and Chair of the OSU Political Science Department, will discuss the 2003 legislative session and try to explain some of the curious choices inevitably made in order to conclude the session.

Tuesday, September 30, 1:30–3:30 PM: Entrepreneurship and the Oregon Economy

Ilene Kleinsorge, Sara Hart Kimball Dean of OSU College of Business, will share how OSU is helping add value to Oregon's economy and explore Oregon's business opportunities, plus the new College of Business entrepreneurship program.

Tuesday, October 7, 1:30–3:30 PM: Human-Environment Connections – Assessing the Risks

More and more we are learning how changes in the environment affect human health. Jennifer Orme Zavaleta, Associate Director for Science for the USEPA, will provide an overview of the human-environment interconnections and focus on emerging infectious diseases such as Lyme disease and West Nile Virus.

Tuesday, October 14, 1:30–3:30 PM: Civic Participation-The Strength of Good Government

Paula Krane, President of the League of Women Voters of Oregon, 1997-2001, will speak on the beliefs of the League of Women Voters, i.e., that it is only through citizens actively participating in our governmental process that a strong government will arise. Learn how through the League you can become better and more effective participants in the process—from simply voting to running for public office and everything in between. The League is not for women only!

Tuesday, October 21, 1:30–3:30 PM: Water – The Last Drop

Benno P. Warkentin, Professor Emeritus in Soil Science, will relate stories about the mix of social, technical, economic, historical, and legal determinants of how we use water – a scarce resource.

Tuesday, October 28, 1:30–3:30 PM: Native American Artifacts and the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act

Deanna P. Kingston, Asst. Professor of Anthropology, will discuss the history of the collection of Native American artifacts in the United States, the context behind the passing of the 1990 Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), and the Native American perspective of repatriation issues.

Tuesday, November 4, 1:30–3:30 PM: Explaining Oregon's High Rate of Hunger

National studies repeatedly report that Oregon has one of the highest hunger rates in the country, thus inspiring political debate and public concern, but explanations for this pattern are not yet clear. Mark Edwards, Associate Professor of Sociology, will report on the results of a 2003 study by Oregon State researchers to try to identify the most important influences on hunger in Oregon.

Tuesday, November 11, 9:30–11:30 AM: Living in an Interesting Time – Civil Liberties After 9/11

Gordon Grant, Co-chair, Benton-Linn Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union, will explore how new laws and a changed political environment have affected civil liberties since 9/11. The focus will be on the effects and consequences of the USA Patriot Act on surveillance, personal privacy, due process, and the position and role of organizations such as the ACLU.

Tuesday, November 11, 1:30–3:30 PM: Pathways to Successful Aging – Options and Alternative Routes

Jon (Joe) Hendricks, Dean of the University Honors Program, will reflect on the choices and options available along the way. As is frequently the case, no single route is best for all nor even an option for all. Instead, the path to successful aging is predicted on optimizing a sense of personal control and avoiding the most obvious pitfalls.

Thursday, November 13, 1:30–3:30 PM: Three Ways of Seeing Religions

Marcus Borg, Hundere Chair of Religion and Culture, will give an exposition of three ways of seeing religious traditions in the modern world: absolutist, reductionist, and sacramental-pluralist. An opportunity for discussion will follow.

2. Indonesia

This series will explore the vast area that comprises Indonesia, its many and diverse traditions, its customs, cuisine, arts, and dialects, its religions, history, geography, politics, educational systems, the roles of women, its functions in the region and the world. Speakers will include faculty who have had first hand, on site experience, and Indonesian natives who are working or studying in the community.

Thursday, September 18, 1:30–3:30 PM: An Overview of Diversity

Tom Cope will provide a general overview of Indonesia, the fourth most populated country in the world, and will survey Indonesia's history, diversity, geography (15,000+ islands), cultures, religions, and natural resources of this modernizing island nation. Mr. Cope has lived and worked with university language instructors in Indonesia for several years.

This first class will meet at the CH2M Hill Alumni Center, Room 114A. Ample parking is available as classes will not yet be in session.

Thursday, September 25, 1:30–3:30 PM: An Education Perspective

Dwi Larso, Ph.D. student in Industrial and Manufacturing Engineering and a university faculty member in Indonesia, will present the challenges of Indonesian education for the student and professor. He will also talk about the Javanese and Muslims in Indonesia past and present.

Thursday, October 2, 1:30–3:30 PM: Political Events Shaping Present Day Indonesia

Tom Cope returns to discuss the major historical events that have impacted Indonesia such as the historical Seafaring Kingdoms, the pre- and post-Colonial Period (1945–47), resolution and Independence, the Suharto Era and current political traditions that are shaping present day Indonesia.

Thursday, October 9, 1:30–3:30 PM: Indonesian Island Culture

Paul Harsono, from Jakarta and a Technical Manager at Hewlett Packard, will present an overview of the Indonesian archipelago. He will consider the country's 15,000 plus islands in terms of their diversity, cultures and religions.

Thursday, October 16, 1:30–3:30 PM: Customs and Ceremonies

OSU students Rina Permanasari (from Pasuran, East Java), and Mona Kosasih (from Jakarta, the capital city of Indonesia), will talk about the customs, ceremonies in different ethnic groups, women's role in society, the educational system and a typical school day in Indonesia. Their talk will conclude with a song or a dance.

Thursday, October 23, 1:30–3:30 PM: Diversity Among Indonesian Cities

A panel of 4 or 5 Indonesian students, from cities such as Jakarta, Surabaya, Ujung Pandang (Sulawesi), and Sumatra will discuss, with reference to their respective cities, foods, dialects in language, children's roles in the family, growing up, friends, society, and religion.

Thursday, October 30, 12:00–4:00: Indonesian Luncheon at the Ring of Fire Restaurant in Eugene

Chef I. Nengah Mandra, from the Indonesian island of Lombok, will prepare a special buffet luncheon, talk about Indonesian culture and cuisine, and demonstrate fruit carving.

The meal will include: krupuk bawang (garlic crackers), Nasi Goreng (fried rice with chicken or tofu), Gado-gado (steamed fresh fall vegetables with peanut sauce, chicken or tofu), Sate Ayam (chicken sate with lemon grass and shallots), Tempeh Manis (sweet soy tempeh), Serunding (toasted coconut with tumeric), Buah Campur (assorted fruit platter with hand carved watermelon dragon head), Bubur Ketan (black rice pudding with coconut milk), Pisang Goren (banana tempura with palm sugar and shredded coconut), Kopi Jahe (ginger coffee), and Teh Jahe (ginger tea).

A bus will leave from the OSU Foundation parking lot at 12:00 noon. Cost is \$35, including gratuity and bus transportation.

Classes are held at the OSU Foundation Board Room, 35th and Western, Corvallis, unless otherwise noted.

Thursday, November 6, 1:30–3:30 PM: Indonesia and the Cultural Geography of the Region

Mary Lee Nolan, Emeritus Professor of Geography, and Sidney Nolan, Ph.D., will show a short video and talk about Indonesia in the context of Southeast Asia. As defined by geographers these modern nations, such as the Philippines, Thailand, Burma, Laos, Cambodia, Vietnam, Malaysia, and Singapore, share historical and cultural similarities and physical proximity that bind them into a logical region.

Thursday, November 20, 1:30–3:30 PM: Undersea Wonders of the Indonesian Ocean

Barton and Claudia Brown will present Indonesia's wondrous sea world as it comes alive in video and slides taken by the Browns during the past three years. Hear about their dive experiences and learn how to travel with all that scuba gear.

3. History and Politics

All history and politics classes will meet in the Conference Room of the Stoneybrook Retirement Village Clubhouse except for the Corvallis Walking Tours, Political Plight class, and the Ft. Hoskins Open House.

Directions to Stoneybrook: Turn south on 53rd Street at the intersection with Hwy 20-34 (Bi-Mart). Turn left onto Country Club Drive and drive to Hollyhock Street at the entrance to Stoneybrook Retirement Village. The Clubhouse is on your right as you approach the main entrance of the residence lodge. Enter the doors closest to Country Club Drive. We are asked to park on either Hollyhock Circle or Birdsong Street. **Please do not park in the parking lot.**

Thursday, September 18, 9:30–11:30 AM: Corvallis/Benton County History, Part I

Judy Juntunen, recently retired Asst. Director and Librarian of the Benton County Historical Museum, returns with her popular two part programs on the area's colorful past. Part I will focus on the pre-20th Century including natural and native American history.

Friday, September 19, 1:30–3:30 PM: A Walking Tour of Historical Downtown Corvallis, Part I

Mary Gallagher, Collections Manager of the Benton County Historical Museum, returns to lead her informative two part walking tour of downtown Corvallis. Part I emphasizes pre-20th Century buildings. Mary has many old pictures and drawings of the waterfront and First Street. Meet at the Fountain on First Street in Corvallis. **Maximum 20 participants.**

Saturday, September 20, 10:00–12:00: Ft. Hoskins Open House

Benton County Parks Department will hold an open house at Ft. Hoskins. Featured in the program will be a Civil War reenactment. More information will be available at the Corvallis/ Benton County History class on September 18. **ALL** encourages you to attend, but will not organize transportation.

Thursday, September 25, 9:30–11:30 AM: Everything You Want to Know About ALL's April, 2004 Tour of Greece and Turkey

Roger Weaver and Paul Dickey will cover itinerary, costs, details, and your questions about this 16-day tour for 15 – 30 people which will follow Roger Weaver's ten week class on Homer's *Odyssey* during Winter quarter 2004. However, the *Odyssey* class is **NOT** a prerequisite for the tour. Everyone who is at all interested is invited to attend this class.

Thursday, October 2, 9:30–11:30 AM: Corvallis/Benton County History, Part II

Judy Juntunen, continues with the 20th Century history of Corvallis and Benton County.

Friday, October 3, 1:30–3:30 PM: A Walking Tour of Historical Downtown Corvallis, Part II

Mary Gallagher will continue the walking tour of downtown Corvallis, emphasizing the 20th Century buildings. Meet at the Fountain on 1st Street in Corvallis. **Maximum 20 participants.**

Thursday, October 9, 9:30–11:30 AM: Problems in American History – The American Revolution

Cliff Trow, OSU emeritus History professor, will lead the class in a lecture/discussion of questions related to the American struggle for independence from Great Britain. He will examine the questions: What caused the revolution? What kind of revolution was it? How and why did it succeed?

Thursday, October 23, 9:30–11:30 AM: Problems in American History – The Framing of the Constitution of 1787

Professor Trow will discuss the motivations of the framers of the constitution, describe the kind of government they created and assess the reasons why their efforts were successful.

Classes are held at the OSU Foundation Board Room, 35th and Western, Corvallis, unless otherwise noted.

Wednesday; October 29, 1:30–3:30 PM: The Political Plight of Our Times

Richard Clinton, OSU Professor of Political Science, will discuss some hypotheses concerning how our political system has evolved into one wherein anyone qualified for high public office cannot possibly be elected, while anyone who is elected cannot possibly be qualified.

Thursday, October 30, 9:30–11:30 AM: A History of Oregon Public Broadcasting

Tom Doggett, Head of TV Programming and a longtime principle of OPB, will share his knowledge of its development and history.

4. Science

Tuesday, September 16, 9:30–11:00 AM: Oregon's Weather – Past, Present and Future

George Taylor, the State Climatologist and GT Columnist, returns with his perspectives and predictions on Oregon's weather and climate.

This class will meet in Richardson Hall, Room 115. Richardson Hall is in the west campus block between 30th and 35th Streets off Jefferson Way. Class participants will find parking on the south side of the building by entering off of 30th. Be sure to stay in the green student parking area. Parking is free, and OSU students will not have yet arrived.

Tuesday, September 23, 9:30–11:30 AM: The Geology of Oregon

Allen Throop, retired geologist, will give a brief overview of plate tectonics and other geologic processes and then look at how the various parts of Oregon came to have their present shape. Special emphasis will be placed on the Oregon coast and Coast Range.

Wednesday, September 24, 1:00–4:00: Agates and Fossils on the Oregon Coast

Guy DiTorrice, known as the "Oregon Fossil Guy"; his motto is "Making Oregon Fossils Fun." The field trip will include briefings on Oregon Coast geology, coastal Miocene flora & fauna, Oregon public beach rules and fossil-collection regulations, beach safety and land conservation, fossil collecting tips, and the opportunity to find snails, clams, petrified and Toreda woods, fish and mammal bones. All equipment and collection materials will be supplied. This is the afternoon part of the ALL trip to the Oregon Coast.

The bus will leave the Foundation parking lot at 8:30 AM and return by 5:00 PM. The morning will be spent at the Yaquina Head Lighthouse with Ron Lovell (See Fine Arts below). Lunch will be ordered and delivered to the fossil lecture site. Lunch cost should be under \$8.00, depending upon what is ordered. Menus will be sent to registrants. **Cost of the bus is \$15 per person for the day. Maximum 25 participants.**

Note: Given the time of day, we will be walking on exposed rock cobble piles between the low and high-tide lines. Footgear should be sturdy enough for loose rock cobbles (the size of softballs and bigger), unsteady ground and one small creek to cross. Boots or strong walking shoes are recommended. Those not wanting to do this part of the class, will be free to walk on other parts of the beach or explore the area.

Tuesday, September 30, 9:30–11:30 AM: Oregon Astronomy

Steve McGettigan of the Mid-Valley Astronomers Club will return to tell us more about the night sky over Corvallis and other interesting astronomy topics.

Tuesday, October 7, 9:30–11:30 AM: The Cosmological Anthropic Principle

Victor Madsen, OSU Emeritus Professor of Physics, will discuss the observed fact that a Carbon-based system of living matter – including – implies that the universe is favorable for the evolution of matter, of stars and of life. While this conclusion, the Anthropic Principle, is not at all surprising, what is surprising is how narrow the range the constants of nature must have been for this favorable environment to have evolved. It is as though the choice of constants was deliberate.

Tuesday, October 14, 9:30–11:30 AM: Fall Foliage Tour of OSU Campus

Pat Breen, OSU Professor of Horticulture, will lead a walking tour of the OSU campus, with emphasis on the colorful fall foliage. Wear comfortable walking shoes. **Meet at the front entrance of the OSU Alumni Center. Maximum 25 participants.**

Classes are held at the OSU Foundation Board Room, 35th and Western, Corvallis, unless otherwise noted.

Friday, October 17, 7:00 PM: Astronomy Star Party

Mid-Valley Astronomers Club members will provide telescopes for ALL participants at a Star Party at the Jorgensen home, 25756 Llewellyn Road. Mars should still be visible then. Maps and directions will be available on September 30.

Tuesday, November 4, 9:30–11:30 AM: Everything You Wanted to Know About Vitamin E, But Were Afraid to Ask

Ten years ago vitamin E was touted as the cure to heart disease. Now, practically every newspaper article warns of the latest trial that shows antioxidants are dangerous. What is the truth? Dr. Maret Traber of the Linus Pauling Institute will share with us her ideas on the subject.

Tuesday November 18, 1:30–3:30 PM: Cancer Chemoprevention by Dietary Phytochemicals

Other than tobacco use, diet is the single greatest determinant in variations in cancer rates throughout the world. Studies have documented the relationship between consumption of fruits and vegetables and cancer risk. Dr David Williams of the Linus Pauling Institute will present some of the most recent studies on chemoprevention of cancer by phytochemicals including some ongoing research at Oregon State University with tea, cruciferous vegetables and chlorophyllin.

5. Fine Arts

Wednesday, September 17, 1:30–3:30 PM: The Arts and the Community

Robert Mix, attorney with a long term involvement in the arts, explores the growth of the arts in a small community (early Corvallis at population of 9,000 to present), opportunities to participate in the arts and the impact of the arts on the residents.

Wednesday, September 24, 8:30 AM–12:00 PM: Why the Nooks and Crannies of the Oregon Coast Are Perfect Locations for Murder

Ron Lovell, a former magazine journalist and OSU Professor Emeritus of Journalism and English, talks about why he picked the Oregon Coast and the university campus as the settings for his two mystery novels. *Murder in Yaquina Head* and *Dead Whales Tell No Tales*. He will discuss how to blend fact with fiction and how to write books that keep people both interested and scared.

This is the morning session of the ALL trip to the Oregon Coast and will meet at the Yaquina Head Lighthouse. The bus will leave the Foundation parking lot at 8:30 AM and return by 5:00 PM. Lunch will be ordered and delivered to participants. Lunch cost should be under \$8.00, depending upon what is ordered. Menus will be sent to registrants. **Cost of the bus is \$15 per person for the day. Maximum 25 participants.**

Wednesday, October 1, 1:30–3:30 PM: Themes and Variations

Dr. David Eiseman, OSU Professor Emeritus of Musicology, will take a simple melody, repeat it and each time change its accompaniment, the meter, the mode, the tempo, the mood. This session will pursue this approach by drawing on popular "tuneful" samples from the eighteenth into the twentieth century.

Wednesday, October 8, 1:30–3:30 PM: The Valley Library's Northwest Art Collection

Tour the Northwest Art Collection of the OSU Valley Library with a member of the Valley Library staff. Learn more about the Oregon *1% for Art* law and how the art selection committee worked with the Oregon Arts Commission to acquire pieces for this special collection by artists from the Northwest. Wear comfortable walking shoes.

Meet in the foyer at the OSU Valley Library Main (north) Entrance.

Wednesday, October 15, 1:30–3:30 PM: A Triple Celebration: Cohan, Seven Keys, and The Majestic

2003 marks the 125th anniversary of George M. Cohan's birth, the 90th anniversary of his 1913 Broadway hit, and the 90th anniversary of The Majestic Theatre. Director Robert Leff, will present an informal chat about the man who owned Broadway, The Majestic Theatre, and directing a comedy that is lighter than air. OSU graduate Robert Leff has been directing for 35 years.

Saturday, October 25, 8:00 PM: Seven Keys to Baldpate

ALL members will attend as a group this George M. Cohan mysterious melodramatic farce directed by Robert Leff. It premiered on Broadway in September 1913, one month after the Majestic Theatre first opened. This production celebrates the Majestic Theatre's 90th anniversary and the 125th birthday of George M. Cohan. **Cost: \$9 per ticket, reserved seating.**

Wednesday, October 22, November 5 and 12, 1:30–3:30 PM: Contemporary American and British Poetry, and Their Immediate Backgrounds

Beginning with W.B. Yeats (1865-1939), Roger Weaver, OSU Emeritus Professor of English, will discuss examples of poems through the Imagist Poets Ezra Pound and Hilda Doolittle, the Beat Generation and the Angry Young Men of the '50's, to current poets such as Rita Dove and Derek Walcott. Since there are no single correct interpretations of poems, your "take" on the examples provided in abundance is welcome. **Cost \$5 fee for photocopied packet of poems.**

Wednesday, November 19, 1:30–3:30 PM: Two Symphonies – Beethoven's 9th and Mahler's 4th

Beethoven's 9th (1824) was a landmark composition that influenced the symphonies of the 19th Century "romantic" period. When Mahler's 4th was premiered in 1901 it confronted and subverted Beethoven's 9th and the romantic tradition.
